
Emergency Response Plan Awareness

Actions taken in the initial minutes of an emergency are critical. A prompt warning to evacuate, shelter or lockdown can save lives. A person trained to administer first aid or perform CPR can be lifesaving. Actions taken by someone knowledgeable of a building and process systems can help control a leak and minimize damage to the facility and the environment. When an emergency occurs, the first priority is always life safety. The second priority is the stabilization of the incident.

Each building at UW–Madison is required to have a completed Occupant Emergency Plan (OEP). The OEP is an all-hazards plan designed around a building's unique layout and function. The primary purpose of the OEP is to provide guidance to building occupants in the event of an emergency, such as a tornado, active shooter, gas leak, or bomb threat.
